
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

## Streets in Bloom in Vancouver: Cherry Blossom Festival, April 5-28



What do nearly 40,000 cherry trees in bloom look like? Imagine whole city blocks on fire with vibrant pinks and whites. Picture a sea of petals, whirling in the breeze and blanketing sidewalks. Envision families and friends picnicking beneath a canopy of fragrant blossoms.

Come and see for yourself during Vancouver's annual <u>Cherry Blossom Festival</u>, April 5-28. Each year, the festival pays homage to the city's thousands of ornamental cherry trees, which

originated as a gift from Japan in the 1930s. This year's festival is one of the largest ever with a full line-up of cherry-themed events. Here are a few highlights:

<u>Blossom Viewing</u>: Some 50 different types of cherry trees will be blooming in 800 different locations around Vancouver during the festival. Check out the special <u>Cherry Blossom Viewing Map</u> for the best sites.

Cherry Jam Downtown Concert, April 5: Culinary tips from sushi super chef Hidekazu Tojo, dance lessons and live performances highlight this free event at the Burrard SkyTrain station. You can also try out the special SakuraB bento lunch box (\$20), featuring sushi and Japanese treats prepared by Vancouver's top Japanese chefs. More info.

Sakura Days Japan Fair, April 7-8: This two day festival in world-renowned VanDusen Botanical Garden celebrates traditional and modern Japanese culture, with tea ceremonies, regional delicacies and sake tastings, origami and flower-arranging workshops and, of course, guided flower viewing tours. Festivities also include performances of Japanese classical dance, drumming, martial arts and music. More info.

Cherry Blossom Umbrella Dance, April 14: Join thousands of cherry fanatics for a unique flash-mob dance in front of the Vancouver Art Gallery. Strut your stuff to a hit Bollywood soundtrack, while twirling a bright pink cherry blossom umbrella. More info.

## For the Birds: World-Class Bird Watching on Vancouver's Doorstep

I'm staring at a regal, three-foot-tall sandhill crane, its slender legs knee-deep in a seaside marsh outside of Vancouver. It sizes me up with its bright pink head – flamboyant colors worthy of a flamingo – then extends its elegant neck and lets out a majestic, ear-splitting squawk.

The stunning bird's winter home is the <u>George</u>
<u>C. Reifel Migratory Bird Sanctuary</u>, a 850-acre
wetland on the Fraser River, approximately 40
minutes from downtown Vancouver. The



sanctuary is one of a network of parks and habitats along the Fraser Delta and surrounding bays that make the area a top destination for bird watchers.

The <u>Reifel Sanctuary</u> is the preferred stopover for countless ducks and birds making their annual migration along the Pacific Coast. From bald eagles and horned owls to snow geese and brilliantly colored wood ducks, more than 250 bird species pass through the sanctuary over the course of the year. An elaborate network of raised trails winds through the park, with bird blinds and an observation tower for optimal viewing.

Just a few miles away, <u>Boundary Bay Regional Park</u> offers equally impressive watching for birders. Tidal flats extend far into the bay, attracting some 1.5 million birds from 20 countries as they migrate along the Pacific Flyway. The waterfront park features more than 12 miles of trails that snake along the shore and through marshes and dunes. Seasonal visitors include red-tailed hawks and bald eagles, snowy owls and ospreys, sandpipers and more than 100 other species.
